To our valued member organizations,

We are proud to share the progress BC Soccer has made in advancing our renewed vision for soccer in BC. The last 12 months have been dedicated to enhancing operational capacity, realigning partnerships, improving collaboration, and setting the stage as we prepare for the opportunities ahead, most notably, the global spotlight of FIFA World Cup 2026™.

Our strategic plan came to life through over 40 active initiatives. These efforts focused on simplifying the participant journey, enhancing access to the game, and modernizing our systems to better serve our members.

This year, we made significant progress in our governance modernization journey. Following the recommendations of the Canadian Sport Governance Code, we began transitioning to a more agile and inclusive board structure with a renewed focus on competency and expertise in board recruitment and leadership development.

We began the process to modernize our governance structure and expanded consultation through Town Hall meetings, reaching all regions of the province. On our commitment to responsible financial management and transparency, we improved technology replacing our legacy accounting system to improve efficiency, reporting, and member support. We finalized a tiered payment system for instructors and launched audits to better track program delivery and expenses. We continued to streamline our competition management platform, improving user experience and laying the groundwork for future enhancements.

We remain committed to securing a state-of-the-art facility. This initiative will be undertaken in collaboration with key partners, reinforcing our commitment to advocate for infrastructure that supports long-term development for players, coaches, and referees across BC. With Vancouver set to host matches for the FIFA World Cup 2026™, BC Soccer has embraced this once-in-a-generation opportunity to support infrastructure and capital projects in BC, engagement of our participants on the delivery of the event, and in celebrating this milestone in our province and in our country.

In 2024-25, we celebrated competitions and events that highlighted the strength of our amateur game, the talent of our participants and the commitment of our organizations to deliver quality programming. We hosted BMO Girls Play BC! and BMO Kids Play BC! from Nelson to Duncan, expanding our partnership with BMO and opening opportunity for more players to enjoy the game as players and coaches. We also expanded our Coach Mentorship Program, supported Indigenous integration in instructor training, and continued to grow our Safe Sport and DEI initiatives, including the launch of the SafeZone, a dedicated support system for participants of the game in BC.

As we look ahead, we are energized by the momentum we've built and the partnerships we've strengthened. Thank you for your continued support, passion, and commitment to soccer in British Columbia. Together, we are building a stronger, more inclusive, and more connected soccer community.

GOVERNANCE MODERNIZATION

BC Soccer has summoned the assistance of Capitis Consulting to revolutionize how soccer is conducted around BC. For two weeks in July, we hosted Town Hall meetings across the Province to hear first-hand what matters to the people of British Columbia.

With a strong focus on accountability, transparency, and the effective use of resources to achieve collective goals, BC Soccer is committed to modernizing governance across British Columbia. A key part of this plan is the transformation and integration of our operational structure to create a more participant-centered system to support the needs of everyone involved with soccer organizations throughout the province.

These Town Halls were attended by players, families, coaches, referees, administrators, and BC residents passionate about the game. The events built on the work already completed, including one-on-one consultations with key stakeholders and partners, individual meetings with member organizations and a province-wide survey gathering valuable insights from soccer organizations

MOVING BC SOCCER FORWARD

Since 1904, BC Soccer has connected communities across the province through the world's game.

Our new brand builds on that legacy - inspired by movement, unity, and the natural beauty of British Columbia.

The new form draws inspiration from British Columbia's natural environment. From flowing rivers to stunning mountains, forests and valleys, it captures the province's dynamic landscape through motion and curvature.

This form represents BC Soccer's five key member groups: Players, Coaches, Referees, Administrators and Families. Each shape connects to form a unified whole, symbolizing their collective role in driving the game forward and building community through soccer.

The final symbol reinterprets the geometry of a traditional soccer ball in a modern, stylized mark. The curved segments suggest energy and motion while retaining a visual link to the sport's most iconic object.

BMO GIRLS PLAY BC! & TELUS SHE CAN

FEMALE ENGAGEMENT

BMO Girls Play BC has been a big success in getting girls (4-10yo) interested in the game of soccer, free of charge. All while introducing them to idols when they're coached by young girls (16-18) looking to add coaching to their soccer resume. This initiative has been important to ensure the next wave of young girls remain interested in soccer.

Canada Soccer, in partnership with TELUS, has concluded a successful second season of the TELUS She CAN Coach national coach recruitment, development, and training project. Diverse women leaders in sport are critical in creating a welcoming and safe space for girls in sport. This project strives to support and advance gender equity in soccer by reducing the barriers of entry for women to coach, with the hope that this will increase the registration of women and girls, and help to balance the gender gap in participation.

Through these two initiatives, plus further endeavors, BC Soccer is committed to increasing the number of women coaches, and encourage more girls to engage in the sport.

DIVERSITY, EQUITY, INCLUSION PLAN

BC Soccer continued to advance its Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) commitments throughout 2024–2025. Building on the foundation established in our DEI Plan and guided by the Action Plan developed with Inclusion Incorporated, this year emphasized translating vision into measurable action.

IMPLEMENTATION OF THE DEI ACTION PLAN

Our DEI Action Plan, launched for the 2024–2025 cycle, focused on embedding inclusive practices across all areas of the organization. Key priorities included:

- **Fostering Inclusion Across the Soccer Community:** Programs and initiatives emphasized creating environments where every participant feels welcomed and valued.
- **Removing Barriers and Enhancing Representation:** Efforts to identify participation barriers and broaden representation in leadership and decision-making structures remained central.
- **Equipping Leaders with Courage and Knowledge:** Targeted leadership development and support have continued to encourage a culture of accountability and advocacy for DEI values.

BUILDING CAPACITY THROUGH PARTNERSHIPS AND LEARNING

In 2024–2025, BC Soccer strengthened its collaborative efforts with partners including Canada Soccer, Sport for Life, and ISPARC. Through these partnerships, we engaged in training and discussions focused on newcomer integration, Indigenous participation pathways, and best practices in inclusive programming.

Our board and committee recruitment processes also reflected DEI priorities, ensuring that governing structures become increasingly representative of BC's diverse soccer community.

As we close this year, our progress reflects not only a commitment to DEI but also a recognition that ongoing reflection, education, and action are essential to meaningful cultural change within soccer in British Columbia.

MEMBERSHIP ENGAGEMENT

MEMBERSHIP SUPPORT

To further support our membership, BC Soccer delivered a series of webinars designed to address current needs and emerging areas of interest across the soccer community. This year's topics included:

- **Fundraising for Sports Organizations** – Facilitated by Tom Berekoff
- **Introduction to SafeZone** – Facilitated by Samantha Heron, Chief Complaints Officer with ITP Sport
- **Futsal Development in BC** – Facilitated by Rob Csabai, Senior Manager, Coach and Player Development

These sessions continued our commitment to providing timely, practical learning opportunities that strengthen organizational capacity and promotes safe and inclusive environments across our membership.

In 2024-25, BC Soccer advanced its efforts to strengthen governance, formalize support to strategic initiatives and enhance engagement with members and affiliated organizations. The association established Working Groups supporting the efforts across the Hall of Fame and Heritage, Governance Modernization and Adult Soccer. Working Groups provide a unified voice for key member organizations across the province. The Working Groups serve in an advisory capacity to operations, providing feedback and recommendations to BC Soccer on programming, services and activities. By forming these Working Groups, BC Soccer reinforced its commitment to inclusivity, collaboration, and effective representation in decision-making

SAFE SPORT

Safe Sport remained at the forefront of BC Soccer's priorities throughout 2025. The introduction of SafeZone, a confidential support service delivered in partnership with ITP Sport, provided participants with guidance on harassment, bullying, abuse, and conflict resolution while helping them understand their options before filing formal complaints.

2026 FIFA WORLD CUP™ ENGAGEMENT

June 11, 2025, marked one year to go until fans from around the world fill the streets of Vancouver. The City celebrated with kids scoring goals, a special proclamation and reveal, and the city glowing.

On Terry Fox Plaza, young players joined local professional players from Vancouver FC and Vancouver Rise FC and celebrity coaches Christine Sinclair and Tosaint Ricketts and members of BC Soccer Staff for a fully produced mini-pitch match with spectators, including 100 local students cheering from the sidelines.

Following the high-energy match, Mayor Ken Sim proclaimed June 13 as "Soccer Day" in Vancouver to honour of the city's diverse and growing football culture. Then the official Countdown Clock was unveiled, ticking down the days until the world's biggest football tournament arrives.

RECONCILIATION

BC Soccer was a proud supporter of the 12th annual Hope and Health Community Camp held at BC Place. The Camp is the signature gathering for over 400 indigenous children and youth from over 70 different nations across BC. Through equipment and coaching, we are proud to partner with Hope and Health to continue to provide access and opportunity to youth across the province. Alongside Hope and health, we look forward to a future where the province can continue to grow and bring the beautiful game to underserved communities.



MARKETING COMMUNICATIONS & SOCIAL ENGAGEMENT

Over the last year, BC Soccer has embarked on a modernization of not only our governance in British Columbia, but also our digital presence and overall brand. SOCCER DEVELOPMENT

The Soccer Development team at BC Soccer plays a pivotal role in delivering impactful programming and services for players, coaches, and referees across the province. Our mission is to support the retention, development, and advancement of all individuals involved in the game.

In the past year, BC Soccer has taken steps to develop how we connect with our members. By increasing personal engagement and utilizing targeted surveys, we've begun reshaping long-standing delivery models to better meet the evolving needs of the soccer community. These efforts have led to more responsive and accessible programming options as well as more frequent in person engagement with the soccer community.

Ongoing gap analysis—both at the regional and provincial levels—continues to provide valuable insight, helping us better align our initiatives with the diverse environments in which our members live, play, coach and officiate. This forward-thinking approach is setting the stage for a more adaptable, inclusive, and effective soccer development system throughout British Columbia.

The Soccer Development team at BC Soccer is actively evolving to meet the needs of today's game while preparing for the future. By calibrating our approach to where our members are—and where the game is headed—we're creating meaningful change through seemingly small but strategic adjustments.

Through enhanced engagement, education pathways, and more responsive program delivery, we are building a development system designed for long-term impact. These efforts are laying the foundation for a more sustainable, inclusive, and dynamic soccer environment across British Columbia.





REFEREE DEVELOPMENT

REFEREE CLINICS

In 2024/25, BC Soccer made significant changes to the Small-Sided and Entry Level courses to align with CSA standards for in-person delivery. The course format as well as content were updated to create a more comprehensive experience for new officials to help them navigate their first years as referees and prepare them as best as possible for the challenges that come with officiating. The new format and content were designed to improve retention of officials to increase the referee pool consistently and sustainably.

In 2024-25 a total of 5,171 referees registered with BC Soccer by completing either the Small Sided, Entry Level and or Refresher courses. Of these referees, 23% were female and 77% were male.

REFEREE SPOTLIGHT

PROVINCIAL PROGRAM REFEREES APPOINTED TO PROFESSIONAL MATCHES

Kelsey Carrothers made her debut at the professional level, earning several appointments in the Northern Super League.

Eray Demirtas continued his strong performances from last year, when he was recognized as BC Soccer's Referee of the Year. He earned several appointments as AR in the CPL, surpassing his debut season last year in number of appointments.

Theo Diederichsen earned several CPL appointments after a year away last year, equaling his previous total number of CPL appointments.

Chris Harrop made his debut in the CPL, confirming his steady development and improvement throughout his time in the Provincial Program and Elite Development Program.

Niko Jecanski solidified his standing as one of the top officials in BC, earning several CPL appointments after making his debut in the league last season.

Heather Lloyd continued her rise along the development pathway, earning her first professional appointments in the Northern Super League.

Mo Mohseni made a successful comeback to Canada Soccer's Elite Development Program, earning several CPL appointments to confirm his strong performances.

REFEREE PROVINCIAL PROGRAM

The Referee Provincial Program is designed to bring together identified Referees from the Regional and Provincial classification streams into the performance training and game environments. The program's focus is to support each referee's development while also creating an overall environment that allows scouting opportunities for the BC Soccer Provincial Upgrade Program and National Nominations with Canada Soccer.

In 2024/25 a total of 7 females and 50 males participated in the program and of those individuals, **7 referees** (2 female, 5 male) were selected to Canada Soccer's Elite Development Program, earning match appointments at the professional level in the CPL, NSL, and MLSNEXT 2024/25.





COACH DEVELOPMENT

COACH COURSES

During the fiscal period between August 2024 and July 2025, over 150 grassroots coaching courses were delivered across the province training over 2,000 coaches. These included the Active Start, Fundamentals, Learn to Train and Soccer for Life levels.

At the C Diploma level, BC Soccer delivered 4 regional courses and trained 112 coaches. These individuals are currently in the process of completing their practical evaluation. The C Diploma is the entry level course in the Canada Soccer Advanced Coach Education Program and is the first time coaches get formally assessed for competency. This course is designed to prepare coaches to progress in the pathway, helping educate coaches about the demands of grassroots soccer.

LEARNING FACILITATOR PROGRAM

The Learning Facilitator Program is a service provided to BC Soccer’s Member Organizations and Affiliate Clubs to endorse their own technical leads to become qualified to deliver Grassroots courses to its coaches with an “In-Club Learning Facilitator” model. This initiative provides the flexibility needed for busy organizations to deliver coach training throughout the year according to its needs and schedules. It also supports organizations to help meet the minimum coaching requirements as outlined in BC Soccer’s rules and regulations.

Within the 2024-25 fiscal year, BC Soccer helped train 8 new Learning Facilitators across various regions to help support organizations to offer coach training with an in-club delivery model. Newly inducted facilitators are supported by co-delivering with another facilitator during their first event and receive feedback on their performance as part of our quality assurance process.

COACH MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

BC Soccer introduced a new Coaching Integration Project initiative for BC SPL coaches to participate in the Provincial Program Identification Match calendar. The goal of this coach education initiative was to provide coaches with insight into provincial and national player identification best practices. Its aim was to empower coaches to observe talent in this environment and contribute their input regarding players of distinction. Ten coaches participated over two match days including both male and female squads. The following testimonial was from one of the attending coaches.

“An initiative like this has huge potential to benefit BC SPL coaches. Firstly, it fosters connection between club and encouraging the sharing of ideas. Coaches gain a broader perspective of a high-performance environment by seeing how BC Soccer staff approach player development and training environments. Secondly, it gives coaches a clearer understanding of the player pool across the league. Seeing top-level players outside their own club provides important context and benchmarks for the invited players. Lastly, being part of this initiative promotes professional growth for BC SPL coaches.”

COACH EDUCATION DIPLOMAS

A new futsal initiative had been in the works for the past year and developed into a coach focused educational one-day workshop. It was designed to inspire coaches about the sport of futsal and how it can be utilized as a development tool for soccer players. This 8-hour workshop was aimed at coaching youth players U10-U13 while the principles learned allow for adapting sessions to suit younger ages as well as adult futsal enthusiasts. BC soccer hopes to bring more awareness about the benefits of futsal as recreational, developmental and competitive outlets for players and coaches to enjoy. The workshop hosted 25 coaches across the province who participated in both classroom theory and on-court practical sessions.

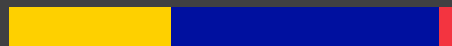

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT REVIEW

2025 YEAR IN REVIEW - BCSPL

BC SOCCER PREMIER LEAGUE

The BCSPL is a standards-based development environment. It is part of the Canada Soccer Player Development Program (PDP), which is a network of standards-based programs that represent the highest level of amateur youth soccer in Canada. For the 2025 season the age groups that participated within the league was: U14 to U18 for female players and U14 to U17 for male players.

Its purpose is to bring together identified players from the BC Soccer membership into training and game environments that supports overall development, as well as providing further opportunities for player identification into higher levels of play: i.e. Provincial Programming, L1BC, College & University Soccer, Canadian Premier League, Vancouver Whitecaps FC MLS Academy, Vancouver Rise FC Academy, Canadian Youth National teams.

The BCSPL is also designed to support the development of coaches and referees, who are required to attain a required level of certification to ensure high standards are in place. This is complimented with ongoing technical support through the BCSPL participating clubs, BC Soccer and Canada Soccer.

Organizations that obtain the Canada Soccer National Youth Club designation (introduced in 2019), as well as receiving BC Soccer Board approval, are eligible to participate in BCSPL. 16 BCSPL franchise clubs participated in the BCSPL from September 2024 to June 2025.

CLUB LICENSING

We have continued to strengthen Club Licensing standards across the province, with all sanctioned clubs now actively engaged in the program. New youth clubs entering a youth district follow a defined process for accessing the sanctioned soccer environment, arriving better equipped with comprehensive policies and procedures that prioritize safety and accessibility. Additionally, BC Soccer has made ongoing improvements to the Club Licensing Pathway, streamlining the process to ensure that each level of licensing has greater significance.



PROVINCIAL PROGRAM

The Provincial Program is designed to bring together identified players from the BC Soccer Premier League (BCSPL), and wider membership, into training and game environments. In addition to supporting each player's development, the program aims to create an overall environment that allows scouting opportunities through universities, colleges, semi-professional, professional programming, and ultimately, Canada Soccer's youth national teams programming.

Within 2024/25, the Provincial Program competed within two Cascadia Cup Events: a U15 Competition of the Cascadia MLS Teams, as well as the Vancouver Whitecaps Academy Showcase at the U17 age group. While its Development Training Group (U18) played various matches throughout the year against the Vancouver Rise FC Academy, Vancouver Whitecaps MLS Academy, and League 1 BC teams.

In May 2025, BC Soccer ran its third annual Provincial Program Identification Weekend to provide BC players within the U16-U18 age groups further exposure to universities, semi-professional, and professional environments.

The summer of 2025 saw both Women's and Men's Canada Summer Games Teams start their preparations for the 2025 Canada Summer Games that took place in St. Johns, Newfoundland.

In total, 422 players (209 female) and (213 male) participated in the Provincial Program in 2024/25, either through the program's identification or development group component.

BMO PARTNERSHIP

The partnership between BMO and BC Soccer began last season with a shared goal: to increase female participation in soccer across the province. Building on BMO's successful model in Ontario, the BMO Girls Play BC! program was launched to support this mission.

BMO Girls Play BC! is a unique leadership and soccer activation day designed for girls. It provides a safe, inclusive space where participants connect socially, explore coaching, and engage in mentorship with female coaches and facilitators. Girls aged 14-19 take the Fundamentals coaching course and then apply their skills at a player festival for U10 female players. In 2024, the program involved 130 players and 51 coaches across 4 camps.

In 2025, BC Soccer and BMO expanded the initiative with BMO Kids Play BC!, a co-ed version of the camp aimed at smaller, remote communities where girls-only programming may not be feasible. This year, we delivered one Kids camp and four Girls camps, resulting in a significant increase in overall participation.

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PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The BMO Girls Play BC! program, launched in partnership with BMO to grow female participation in soccer, saw significant growth from 2024 to 2025. In 2024, the initiative delivered four girls-only camps, engaging 130 players and certifying 51 coaches. Building on that success, 2025 introduced the co-ed BMO Kids Play BC! model for smaller and remote communities, alongside four Girls camps, resulting in a combined total of 276 players and 81 certified coaches across five locations.

Notable 2025 highlights included Kamloops hosting 71 players with 18 coaches, and North Vancouver attracting 81 players with 25 coaches. The year-over-year increase of 146 players (+112%) and 30 coaches (+59%) reflects the program's expanding reach and impact, offering inclusive, mentorship-driven experiences that strengthen grassroots soccer across the province





COLLABORATION WITH THE KOOTENAYS

In June of 2025 BC Soccer staff visited Nelson, BC to host an array of events for the community. There was a BMO Girls Play BC! Event, a Goalkeeper Clinic as well as a Player Identification day for the BC Provincial Program.

The purpose of the weekend was to support player identification on behalf of the provincial program. To better understand the current state of soccer programs in small and rural communities, like Nelson, and identify opportunities for players, coaches and referees.

BC Soccer's visit to Nelson was met with open arms and a whole lot of excitement. It felt like just about everyone in town had heard that something was happening with soccer that weekend – even if they didn't know the details, there was a buzz in the air and a joyful curiosity throughout.

There's a strong willingness to collaborate with nearby towns, all working together to grow opportunities and strengthen programs for everyone involved. It's the kind of grassroots dedication that makes small-town sport so special.

DEVELOPMENT GRANTS PROGRAM

Each year, BC Soccer offers Grants which serve the dual purpose of acknowledgment of the associations Strategic Plan initiatives and reinforcing alignment between Canada Soccer's Club Licensing Program and other national projects. These Development grants offer supplementary support to organizations, all while concentrating on the elimination of potential obstacles that may impede their ability to meet or exceed the Canada Soccer Club Licensing Standards.

This season, BC Soccer has continued to actively engage with clubs and organizations across the province to maximize the reach and impact of the program. For the 2024–25 fiscal year, we successfully awarded 30 grants of \$1,000 each, reaching the program's full budget allocation.

SCHOLARSHIPS PROGRAM

As an administrator, Rob was Referee Scheduler, Registrar, Discipline Chair and President of the Fraser Valley Soccer League.

Joan has been involved in soccer since 1997 when she started with the Surdel Girls Soccer Club as club registrar and remained with them until 2001. She became SDGSA Girls District Registrar in 1999 and was part of the SDGSA merger with SFDA when she became responsible for boys and girls registration within Surrey, Delta and White Rock. She has remained with SFDA until July 31st, 2025.

AWARD OF MERIT: WERNER HEINE

Werner Heine exemplifies the 'spirit of the game' through his steadfast commitment and dedication to advancing soccer initiatives in 100 Mile House. His ambition led him to providing youth and children with a proper playing facility, moving them off the dirt fields of local schools. Through relentless efforts, Werner secured sponsorships and established partnerships that culminated in the creation of a dedicated soccer park in 2010. Beyond his work as a coach and president of the board, Werner initiated an impactful refereeing program. He inspired both players and community members to engage in officiating and successfully established a mentorship program to support new referees. His contributions have left a lasting legacy within our soccer community.

AWARD OF MERIT: VINCE GRECO

Vince has been the face and facilitator of the VISL for over 26 years, as a volunteer and most recently as the Executive Director. He has raised the bar year after year for the league, and he has contributed to the VISL being known as one of the premier leagues across Canada. His commitment to everyone in his community is second to none.

AWARD OF MERIT: GRANT OLSON

After a playing career that spanned nearly 50 years, Grant then coached Girls Youth Soccer at Bays United for 16 years due to the interest of his 3 daughters. As if playing and coaching wasn't enough, Grant has been a title sponsor for the VISL for 10 years; supporting financially with hosting year end banquets, as well as special events, such as 3 BC Soccer Provincial Cup Draws. He has helped the entire Vancouver Island Community, and that is what makes him so special.

ADMINISTRATOR OF THE YEAR: SUE BAXTER

Sue Baxter has been instrumental in supporting new club members at SFDA with clarity, patience, and precision. She created a simple yet effective system that makes it easy for new administrators to follow processes and stay organized. Her responsiveness and willingness to guide others through complex procedures have made a lasting impact on the growth of clubs in the district.

COACH OF THE YEAR: FARIVAR TORABI

Farivar has brought over 100 players to the FVSL over the last 3 years and developed such an excellent development stream of young talent. This season he has accomplished an unheard of level of accomplishment: U19 Division Winners, U19 Cup Winners, Premier division Winners, Pakenham Cup runner up and entered the 2025 BCSA Provincial Cup as the FVSL #1 seed in the 'A' Cup. He has shown such a high level of standards with his relationships with opponents and match officials and has become one of our most popular team coaches in the league.

EXCEPTIONAL LEADERSHIP: RYAN BEER

There is exceptional leadership and unwavering commitment to the long-term development of the players and the commitment to their coaches and the game of soccer throughout the Prince George area. Their vision includes a clearly articulated, age-appropriate development pathway for players and a comprehensive support system for coaches, ensuring consistency, quality, and long-term success throughout the club. LIFE MEMBERSHIP: TERRY FELIX

Terry Felix has made profound contributions to soccer in British Columbia, as a trailblazer, role model, and advocate. In 1983, he became the first Indigenous professional soccer player in North America, representing both the Vancouver Whitecaps and the Canadian Men's National Team. Beyond his on-field achievements, Terry's lifelong dedication to the game continues to shape the British Columbia soccer landscape. He has been a mentor and advisor to Indigenous youth through sport-for-development programs like Hope and Health and Nautsa'mawt FC, where he shares his story and lived experience to uplift and empower the next generation. His quiet leadership and commitment to representation have helped Indigenous youth see themselves in the sport, fostering inclusion, belonging, and belief.

Terry's legacy is not only one of athletic excellence but of service, humility, and visionary impact. His contributions have created a ripple effect - opening doors, shifting narratives, and building a more equitable future for soccer in British Columbia and beyond.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP: GAYLE STATTON

Gayle Statton has lived and flourished in BC all her life. A multi-sport varsity athlete with a huge love of sport. Gayle was on the BC Soccer Board of Directors since 2018 and President since 2020. Gayle was also the Chair of the inaugural Member Council for Canada Soccer – an inclusive Canada Soccer Membership Council striving for good strategic communications. Statton has 30+ years contributing to progressive and positive change at the grassroots levels in BC advancing to the Provincial and now the National levels of leadership.

PLAYER OF THE YEAR: VICTORY SHUMBUSHO

Over the last few seasons' Victory has shown great dedication to the Fraser Valley Soccer League as a top striker winning golden boot 2 years in a row as well as the Premier League, League Cup and Pakenham Cup trophies. He has also been an ever present on the league ALL STAR team for 3 years, culminating in the recent win over the Vancouver FC CPL team, led by his industrious efforts throughout.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION: KRISTA PROFILI-FONTES

Krista has shown over the past 10 years her dedication to making sure soccer happens in her community. From organizing the teams and coaches, mini-world cup-style jamboree events, painting fields, coaching and now as a referee. Krista is a firm believer that soccer should be offered to all and she does her best to limit financial barriers. She works tirelessly to find volunteers for all events she plans and is successful large part to her demeanour.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION: STEVEN NEWMAN

A game official that a referee scheduler and players can count on. Steve currently referees for Juan De Fuca (Youth), The VISL (Adult men) and the LIWSA (Adult women). Players at all levels respect him and what he brings to the pitch. He recognizes players, teams, clubs and organizations and what they need to succeed. He provides this opportunity and has done so with no slow down whatsoever. Other than when he hears the links calling. The LIWSA has a match report system where the referee's performance is rated after a match, and Steve often scores a ten, which simply does not happen too often these days.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION: NEIL SEDGWICK

As Technical Director, Neil's dedication to player development—from the earliest grassroots levels through to university athletes—is truly unmatched. He has consistently demonstrated that every player matters, fostering an environment where individual growth is supported and celebrated. Beyond PGYSA, Neil actively collaborates with the neighbouring clubs and districts to bring increased opportunities for all players, coaches, and referees alike. His efforts have helped build strong regional connections and an inclusive, thriving soccer community. Through his leadership, PGYSA has become a recognized leader in youth soccer across Northern British Columbia, guided by principles of safe sport, inclusivity, and excellence.

REFEREE OF THE YEAR: SIDNEY COMPSTON

For more than 15 years, Sid has refereed, coached, mentored and taught from grassroots programs and has even been an assessor. For numerous years he was the RDO for the Kootenays. He has also been the Referee Coordinator in his local club as well as organizing referees to help officiate numerous tournaments in and around the Kootenays. He is well respected by players, coaches and parents alike. His love for the game not only shows in every interaction he has with those he interacts with but is also very infectious. It is not uncommon for Sid to be in his hometown of Trail during the week and on the weekend, you can find him teaching and mentoring other officials as far away as Golden, Fernie or somewhere in between.

WOMAN OF DISTINCTION: KIM BULL

Kim has been coaching in BC for over 20 years. She has coached at various levels, including grassroots, provincial programs, collegiate level, and with the Whitecaps.

Kim's passion for the game is unbelievable and inspiring how she wants players of all abilities to love the game and reach their highest potential. Kim is also an advocate for Safe Sport at BFC and started the Club's Athlete Council which has players within the Club help in being part of the direction the Club is going. Female Fridays has also been a big success at BFC where young female players come together to connect with older female players for mentorship. Kim has so much passion for improving coaches and players that she is someone BC Soccer should really consider for this "women of distinction" award.

PRESIDENT AWARD: VANCOUVER RISE FC

The Vancouver Rise are one of the six founding teams in the Northern Super League, Canada's professional women's soccer league. As the first and only professional women's soccer league in Canada, the NSL is here to create a legacy. One that is rooted in access, equity, and excellence. One that invites every player, fan, and community to shape the future of the game. One that is something the next generation can believe in.





SOCCER HALL OF FAME OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

2025 INDUCTIONS

PLAYER

JAMIE LOWERY

A premier player in Vancouver Island's soccer history, midfielder Jamie Lowery from Port Alberni captained the UVic Vikes, played 32 times for Canada's men's national teams, including at the 1986 World Cup finals, played 112 games for the 1987-1992 Vancouver 86ers, and was a stalwart in Island representative teams.

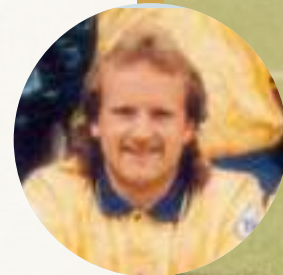
CHRISTINE SINCLAIR

Inducted into the Canada Soccer Hall of Fame in May 2025, Christine Sinclair of Burnaby, member of the Order of Canada, played 331 games for Canada's Women's National Team from 2000 to 2023, scoring a world record 190 goals. Sinclair led Canada's WNT to Olympic Bronze medals in 2012 and 2016 and the Olympic Gold Medal at Tokyo 2020.

COACH

DICK MOSHER

Dick Mosher played for the UBC Thunderbirds soccer team in the 1960s, returning as a Professor of Kinesiology. Mosher coached the university's men's and women's soccer teams from 1986 to 2009, winning nine national varsity championships in 24 years, three with the women's team and a record six with the men's team.

Beginning in 1976, Gordon Rogers of Vancouver refereed for 43 years, rising to appointment as a FIFA Assistant Referee for 1992 and 1993. He officiated in the 1993 Concacaf Gold Cup Final at Mexico's Estadio Azteca. Rogers was also a BC Soccer Referee and Coach Instructor and BC Soccer Director.



BUILDER

CHARLIE CUZZETTO

Vancouver's Charlie Cuzzetto is recognized as a builder of futsal in BC and Canada over four decades. Cuzzetto coached and managed Canada teams at four Futsal World Championships (1985 - 1996), was President of Futsal Canada from 1991 to 2003 and led Futsal Canada into affiliation with Canada Soccer. Later, Cuzzetto was BC Soccer President and Canada Soccer Director.



GALE RUSSELL

Gale Russell was a committed leader of youth and adult soccer in Prince George, and a strong advocate for recognition of northern and Interior soccer in the province. A coach, referee, executive and District President from the 1980s to 2000s, Russell spearheaded new programs, facilities and growth, and brought provincial and national championships to his northern community.

2018 BC TIGERS HURRICANES MEN'S

The 2018 BC Tigers Hurricanes Men's Team from Surrey won the Vancouver Metro League Premier Division, the BC championship and the national club championship. They are the first predominately South Asian team to become Canadian club champions. This milestone national success was a source of great pride within the South Asian Community and an inspiration to the community's youth.



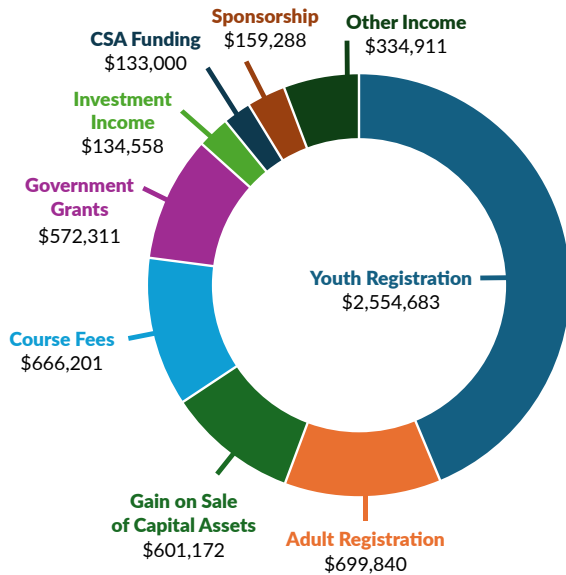
1996-2000 SIMON FRASER UNIVERSITY WOMEN'S

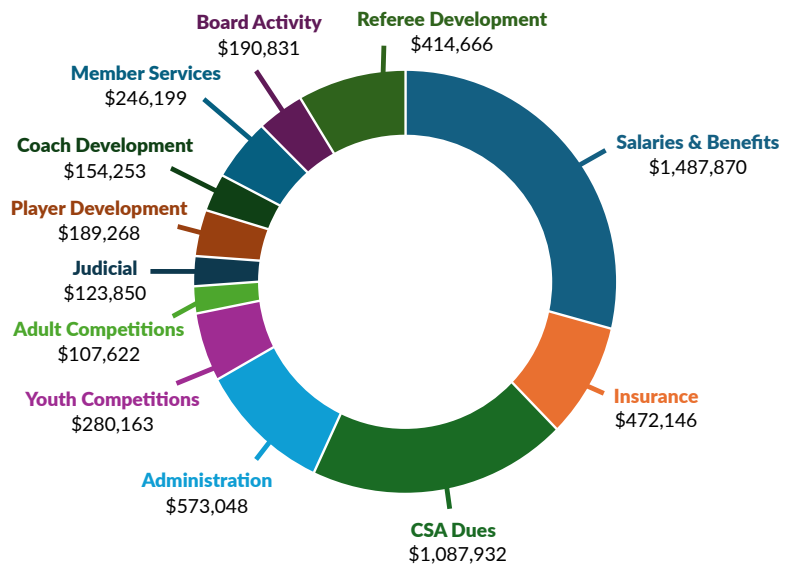

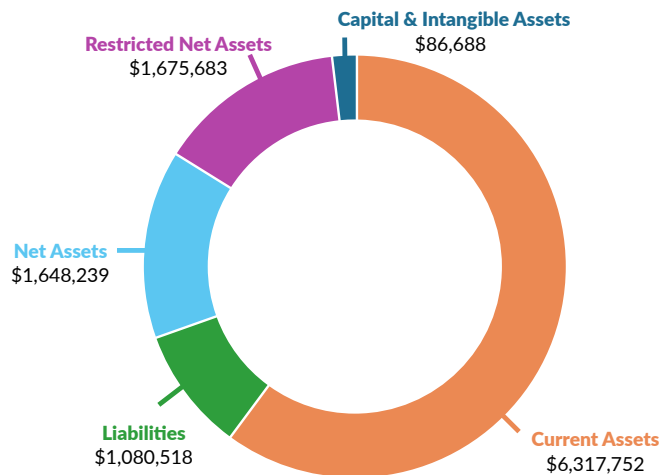
REVENUE
