Bryan Sask grew up in Northern Alberta and developed his love for softball, playing alongside his brother throughout his youth. This was only the start of his lifelong passion for the sport which would later shape his coaching and coach development career. In the late 1960's, Bryan moved to Fleetwood, BC and began coaching his three younger sisters.



His coaching career continued into the 1980's, where he gained extensive coaching experience across all levels of softball, from Learn-to-Play programs to college and national level competition. Bryan became heavily involved with Softball BC, coaching and building player development initiatives, delivering numerous softball and coaching clinics across BC. He quickly earned a reputation as a knowledgeable, approachable, and highly respected coach educator. Bryan spent his time mentoring countless coaches, sharing resources and guidance through clinics, workshops, phone calls and emails. He dedicated countless volunteer hours to improving coaching standards and athlete development across Canada.

In 2013, Bryan was invited by NWT Softball and Softball BC to travel to the Beaufort Delta region of the Northwest Territories. There he spent his time, conducting minor softball player development camps in Inuvik and Tsiigehtchic and providing coaching education and strategies to local volunteers and parents. Bryan established strong relationships with the northern softball communities, returning multiple times to serve as a lead instructor and facilitator in coaching clinics, player development camps, school softball tours, and community softball initiatives. Ultimately, Bryan played a significant role in building the growth of minor softball in the Northwest Territories.

Bryan's long-lasting impact as a coach developer highlights his dedication to lifelong learning and coaching excellence. He was described as 'a true coach developer whose dedication, passion, and love for softball helped shape the sport for future generations'.
